

A WALK DOWN THE PATH

On: The End

The summer of 1972 was my first summer youth ministry at West Side Church of Christ in Des Moines, IA. In those days we didn't call that sort of thing an internship as is done today. We learned what worked and what didn't work by trial and error...lots of error! Linda and I were married at the end of that summer.

Summer 1973, we returned to West Side for another summer youth ministry. After returning to Ozark Bible College for my junior year (Linda's 4th year) we were hired for a weekend youth ministry with First Christian Church of Dewey, OK. We served there for the balance of that school year (after which Linda graduated, 1974) and well into the next school year into February 1975 (my senior year). We made some life long friends there who have continued, even to today, to be great encouragers in our ministries.

Prior to my graduation from Ozark in May 1975, I was hired by Riverlawn Christian Church in Wichita, KS, as Associate Minister. We began that ministry on weekends prior to graduation and moved to Wichita with our few "Vintage Early American College Kids Furniture" immediately after graduation. We worked with that wonderful church for nine years during which the church doubled in size, my youth programs grew, and I changed positions to start new ministries at the church. Linda and I made life long friends with whom we still are overjoyed when able to see them, and who continue to be encouragers to us in our ministry efforts.

In May 1984 we began a new ministry of preaching to a struggling congregation who had confidence in our ability to lead. I pretended to know what I was doing while stumbling around trying to find a way to do something I'd never done before. We made progress, great progress. We grew when the county around us remained stagnant. Then the economy and other things caused disruptions which truly tested my metal. We survived and now are poised to move with momentum into the future. We have made many more friends who continue to be great encouragement in times of joy and even in times of trouble. Some of those close friends have moved to far places, but many surround us every Sunday.

Over all these years, I look back and wonder how much better results might have been had I made some other, perhaps better, decisions. One never knows. But I find satisfying pride in many new believers baptized into the Kingdom. I find satisfying pride in the college students we trained for ministry. I find satisfying pride in the children who grew up in our church and were ordained into ministry. I find satisfying pride in seeing adults accept new responsibilities in the Kingdom and learning how to impact their faith and the world in which they live. I find satisfying pride in reflection on my own family, a loving and supportive wife, children with strong and sound faith, grandchildren who love the church and the Lord.

It's May again. 2019. Another episode of ministry change. My retirement. Some big party is planned for Saturday, and a fun worship for Sunday. I'll probably be an emotional mess providing entertainment for my "friends", and wishing Dad, Mom, and Jim could be here to share in the joy with my family. But that's not to be. I will always identify myself as a member of Rolling Hills. I love this church and the people of this church. You are our extended family, just as all our friends from congregations over the years are our extended family. Following May 5, Linda and I will probably not be seen for a few months, enabling RHCC to adjust to new leadership, whoever that turns out to be. But it is my full intention to return and serve in whatever capacity will most assist and encourage the new pastor in his ministry.

When I was a student member of Ozark's Concert Choir, we sang three signature songs which are still held in high esteem. They are: "Jesus Is All the World to Me," "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," and "Wherever He Leads I'll Go." Mark Scott, a friend and professor at Ozark Christian College, recently reminded an audience of these three songs. He pointed out they point to the purpose of the college that drives the students who graduate: the Christ, the Cross, the Commission. It is not my intent to "quit" ministry. It is my intent to minister in a different fashion. When my eyes dim and my mind fails in my old age, I pray that I will always, in my heart, cherish the Christ, the Cross, and the Commission. That is my prayer for all of you, as well.

God bless you all as the future unfolds for us all in new adventures of faith. Remember always that our love for you, Linda's and mine, will never fade. The end is not really the end. We will see you again, if not in worship, then on the other shore. You are our cherished family.

We will welcome some special guests, including former interns and "Timothy's", for Steve's final Sunday as lead pastor.
























A WALK DOWN THE PATH with Steve

It was Monday afternoon, May 7, 1984. I had left my home and family in Michita to come to Topeka where I would begin making a new home. Instead of driving the Turnpike, I decided to take the back roads. The Flint Hills of Kansas have a beauty and historic quality all their own. It was turning out to be a longer, but enjoyable trip.

I was in no hurry. I had no pressing appointments. I wasn't even speeding (most of the time!). Mile after mile of stone fence followed the highways at one point. The historical marker (yes, I even stopped to read a historical marker) said that in 1867 the government paid people for building those fences when laws were passed ending the open range. Later on I was startled when a blue heron burst into the air from its concealment in the ditch along the highway on which I was driving.

By now I had spent more time than I had originally intended on my leisurely drive. It was time to arrive in Topeka and begin unpacking. Unfortunately, I was still on the highway. Then it happened. Some old cow was standing smack dab in the middle of the highway. Three pickups and my Mustang were stopped waiting for that cow to decide what to do. A couple of farmers piled out of the lead truck and chased her off the road. Needless to say, I continued my trip and arrived.

But think about that cow for a minute. She didn't belong there. She wasn't as smart as we were (I don't think), yet she had us stopped.

Sometimes cows show up in our Christian experience. Cows can keep us from Sunday School. Cows can keep us from worship. Cows can prevent us from having the testimony we should. Cows can cause our lights to shine less bright. The most frustrating thing about those cows is we know they don't belong there. We know they are impeding our progress. But we have to exert effort to chase them away. That's the catch.


